here is a sense of awe that comes with viewing an artistic masterpiece and Gillespie & Steel's creations are no exception. This rings true when viewing the villa designs in the prestigious Apes Hill Club such as the luxurious residence property of Arawidi, in Barbados. Apes Hill itself, renowned for its golf course and polo field, adds to the allure with its breathtaking views set 1000 feet above sea level in the centre of the island. Their attention to details, matched with the comfort level, enhances the opulent feel of these private residences. On the tourism front, Barbados' Coral Reef Club stands out. It epitomizes West Indian elegance and has become known for its classic island feel, all at the hands of Gillespie & Steel. Most recently, I was told, they were asked to design their new spa facility and did an outstanding job in complementing the already special ambience of the resort. Also, in Barbados, Gillespie & Steel can add Mantaray Bay to its list of accomplishments as the stunning multi-level ocean front property of luxury apartments is graced with a glorious view of the Caribbean Sea. Speaking of luxury, the company is also responsible for the opulent design of Barbados' first high-end retail mall, the Limegrove Lifestyle Centre. The company also assisted with the interior design of one of the Centre's luxury brand stores.

As we leave the many accomplishments in Barbados, we visually visit St. Lucia's Marina Village and I learn that this picturesque Village is a marriage of St. Lucian architectural heritage and the contemporary flair that Gillespie & Steel is known for. The Village, itself, has become the heart and focal point of Marigot Bay located on St. Lucia's scenic west coast. Beach located in the Florida Panhandle as part of the original development of the town. As a result, the pool now bears the name of Barbados — in homage to the company's location.

While the luxurious is always a sight to behold, it warms the heart, especially a Bajan's, to see the contribution Gillespie & Steel has made to some of my island's more prominent and historic structures. With properties such as The Barbados Pavillion, Arlington and George Washington House under its belt, the refurbishment of these properties has contributed to maintaining Barbados' World Heritage Site designation. For those who don't know, the plantation-style George Washington House was named after the first President of the United States after his brief stay in Barbados in 1751. Not to be left out of the mix, One of Barbados' main tourist attractions, Harrison's Cave, also saw some major redevelopment at the hands of Gillespie & Steel with the entire reception facility adding to the awe and mystery of what lies below.

It is not only the average observer that recognizes the creativity and professionalism behind Gillespie & Steel but awards from notable bodies such as the Commonwealth Association of Architects, the Barbados National Trust and the Americas Residential Property Awards are a testament to the significant impact that their designs have made.
